



### **TERMINOLOGIES**

- WACE Western Australian Certificate of Education
- ATAR Australian Tertiary Admission Rank
- SCSA Schools Curriculum and Standards Authority
- Course academic program produced by SCSA
- Endorsed program Program produced by another provider – can be the school – which is endorsed by SCSA and will count towards the WACE e.g. ECU UniPrep, ECCS Christian Studies
- VET Vocation Education and Training TAFE and RTO produced certificate courses that count towards achieving a WACE

#### What is the WACE?



#### The Western Australian Certificate of Education:

- Includes a minimum of 20 Units studied in Years 11 &
   12
- 10 Units (includes equivalents) must be studied in Year 12
- Unit equivalents include VET and Endorsed Programs (e.g. Workplace Learning, ECU UniPrep)
- 4 units of English over Years 11 & 12
- One pair of List A units (English, Humanities, Arts)
- One pair of List B units (Math, Science, Technologies)
- 14 C grades or higher
- 6 Cs in Year 12 units

Units and unit equivalents are often referred to as WACE points

## Why a WACE not achieved by some students

- Do not meet literacy and/or numeracy standard (OLNA)
- Do not pass enough units 14 units must have a C grade or higher.
  - Do not achieve a pass in 8 of the Year 11 units
  - Do not pass enough Year 12 units (need to pass 6 in Year 12)
    - >Students have picked courses that they are not suited to
    - >Students do not work at their courses either in class, at home or both because they lack intrinsic motivation.

### **WASSA**

The Western Australian Statement of Student Achievement (WASSA) is issued to all Year 12 students at the completion of their secondary schooling. The WASSA provides a formal record of what students leaving in Year 12 have achieved as a result of their school education in Western Australia.







## **VET in Schools**

Some of our Year 12 students are completing the Certificate III in Business

Year 12s who have not completed the **Certificate II in Hospitality** will have the opportunity to do so this year. This is essential for students to complete this competently to achieve the WACE.


Students may also do either a one or two-day course at a TAFE campus.



Certificate courses provide unit points towards the WACE.

Certificate II – 4 WACE points (2 for Year 12)

Certificate III – 6 WACE points (4 for Year 12)






### OLNA

- Online Literacy and Numeracy Assessment
- Demonstrate the skills regarded as essential to meet the demands of everyday life and work in a knowledge-based economy.
- 2 Opportunities to sit the OLNA in Year 11 and 2 in Year 12
   1 in Term 2 and one in Term 3
- After Year 12 students can apply to sit the test for each component that they have not demonstrated the standard in. Applications can be made via the WACE after Year 12 page on the SCSA website.

## Externally Set Tasks (ESTs) Year 12 only



- Students doing General or Foundation Courses
- The EST is compulsory and forms part of the school-based assessment and is included as a separate assessment type with a weighting of 15% for the pair of units.
- Occurs in Term 2 under standard test conditions on material from Unit 3.
- The EST will take 50 minutes.
- The ESTs are marked by teachers in each school using a marking key provided by the Authority.

ESTs are NOT General equivalents of the WACE Exams.



## School Exams

- Run at the end of each semester.
- Most Semester 1 exams in Year 11 are 2.5 hours in length.
- After this, exams are 3 hours in length for most courses.
- Occurs in the Youth Centre away from noise and distractions.
- Year 12 Semester 2 exams begin in the Term 3 holidays Wednesday of second week 2 October 2024.
- Exam timetables will be available at least 4 weeks before the exams.
- Students should bring photo identification to exams e.g. smart rider, driver's license

## Holidays during the term

Please do not take Year 11 and 12 students away during the school term.

Missing a week of school means that a student has 25 hours of work to catch up.

Also, it not advisable for Year 12 ATAR students to go away during the Term 3 holidays.

These should be used for study for the upcoming Semester 2 Exams.



### **WACE Exams**

- ATAR course examinations are developed and conducted for all Year
   12 ATAR courses.
- Year 12 students who are enrolled in Units 3 and 4 of an ATAR course are required to sit the ATAR course examination.
- These exams are compulsory. Failure to sit the WACE exam means that the units studied are not counted towards the WACE.
- If students are unable to sit a WACE exam due to illness a misadventure form can be downloaded from the SCSA website and must be submitted by the due date.
- There are both written and practical examinations for some ATAR courses.
- Exam timetables will be available in September.

### WACE Exams

ATAR course examinations complement and support school assessment in the following ways:

- a student receives an ATAR course report for each ATAR course examination completed
- teachers receive diagnostic feedback from the ATAR course examinations to help them review and refine their teaching
- generate an ATAR for university admissions purposes
- employers and training organisations have access to meaningful and comparable data.

## Parents or Guardians

Staying focused is important for all students as they work towards finishing Secondary School. There are some simple things you can do.

- Help your teen stay focused on their goals, reaching the end of the school year and starting the next chapter of their life's adventure.
- Resist society's narrow definition of success and encourage your teen to develop their own personal definition of success.
- Talk with your teen in particular about your expectations; Students experience much less worry and stress about schoolwork when they feel like they are meeting parents' expectations. Students will often assume what these are if they are not said. It also helps to have reasonable expectations.
- Tell your teen you love them no matter what grades or ATAR or offers they get.



## **Effective study strategies**

#### Strategies for managing distractions

It can be hard to concentrate on homework or study when there are too many distractions.

- Talk with your child about what they are most likely to be distracted by and how they can limit these.
- Set up an area that is quiet and well lit with good air flow.

## Avoid distractions

- Consider making this area a phone free zone or turning off social media notifications during set study periods.
- It is important that your child has regular breaks while studying or doing homework / assignments and sets aside time for fun. If they know that they will get time to connect with others and do the things they enjoy they will find it easier to focus during set study periods.




## Parents / Guardians

- Space provide a quiet space for homework and study.
- Time free up some time by relaxing expectations for chores and family commitments during exam periods; assess part-time job commitments and limit hours, if required



- Routine establish a regular routine and flexible schedule to create balance
- Clarification encourage your child to ask their teacher questions if they're unsure





Balance – encourage extracurricular activities and connection with support networks



Rest – maintain a regular sleep schedule and encourage recreation with regular short and long breaks to relax, exercise and socialise



Breaks – teach the importance of study breaks, and returning to study as planned after a break – make a list activities that can be breaks and rewards





Distractions – minimise disruptions to study schedules by encouraging breaks from phones and social media

Talk – find out from your child about when, where and how they study best – encourage them to take advantage of any course clubs or study technique sessions run by the school

#### **TISC'S ROLE**


TISC runs a joint applications system for admission to undergraduate courses at the universities below.

- Curtin University
- Edith Cowan University (ECU)
- Murdoch University
- The University of Notre Dame Australia
- The University of Western Australia (UWA)

TISC receives and processes applications for admission to these universities. TISC doesn't select applicants, assess qualifications or decide eligibility for admission - the universities do this. If you want detailed information about a course or want to check the likelihood of selection, you should ask the Admissions Centre of the university offering that course.

#### The TISC Guide

- The TISC Guide for 2025 will be released after the middle of the year.
- Students intending applying for university will receive a TISC Guide.
- The Curriculum Team will help students apply for university if they need help.
- We will spend time together becoming familiar with the TISC website.
- Dates for applying for university will be released later in the year.



## 5 steps to applying for university



#### 1. Discover the possibilities.

There are so many interesting courses available to you, it's worth spending some time investigating all the possibilities.

#### 2. Check if you're eligible

See if you've got the right background to get into a course, or explore the pathways that can help you get where you want to go.

#### 3. Put in an application



#### **Missed Assessments**

A note from a parent or a medical certificate must be provided by students who are absent for an assessment.

Must be done after school. An assessment catch up club will be run once a week from 3.20 - 4.20 for students to catch up on missed assessments. Students will need to sit the assessment on the next catch up after their return to school.

Students must take responsibility for their assessments. If they are struggling in any way they should ask for help from the teacher before the assessment is due.
